

Just wash the dishes

About 12 years ago, while I was studying in the AIM program, I was placed in a housing situation with two other guys that I didn't know all that well. As is typically the case for college age men, our collective cleaning habits left a little to be desired. After a few months, one area was putting some serious strain on our relationships as roommates. We had tried a rotating schedule of dish washing responsibilities, but that didn't seem to help, as we each had different takes on when the dishes needed to be cleaned and put away. I eventually decided to take on what I believed was more than my fair share of the work. I explained to my roommates that if they would simply rinse their dishes when they were finished eating (as opposed to leaving food to dry and turn into a glued-on mess) and leave them in sink, that I would be the permanent apartment dish washer. After a week or so of still cleaning caked on food on every dish, I was at my wits end. I found myself full of frustration and resentment. I met with our ministry leader (aka our boss) to present my case in hopes that he would bring the heat and back me up to my roommates making them pick up the slack. I presented my case to him, making clear my "more than fair" arrangement the other guys. When I was done explaining he paused, searching for words that were gracious and kind, and then gave me possibly the best life advice I've ever received. He told me kindly and clearly "just wash the dishes".

Needless to say, I was severely disappointed for a while. It seemed so unfair. I felt like I was already giving so much, I just wanted a little bit of concession in return. In time, I accepted his instruction and (if I'm honest, begrudgingly at first) just washed the dishes for my roommates. What happened was a blessing that I still enjoy to this day. The 1 other roommate that was responsible for the majority of what I considered terribly gross dishes is still my closest friend in the world. In fact, we refer to each other as our brother, and rightfully so. I attribute this relationship as God given, and it probably would not be so without that painful advice from my mentor.

It's not easy to serve. It hurts. Sure, it's easy sometimes, when we condition our service with our own expectations for what we would like to receive in return, but that's not Christ-like service. There's a story in John 13 that teaches exactly what I'm talking about. Unless you've only been a Christian for a month or two, you really should know the story without even opening your Bible, but just go re-read it. Imagine that setting. Each of Jesus' disciples refused to be the one who did the dirty, demeaning job of washing everyone else's feet. The lesson that Jesus showed them is the same that I received many years ago. Just wash em! When we submit to this kind of radical self-sacrifice, and truly serve others without qualification, we allow room for God to give some of his greatest blessings. The inverse is also absolutely true: when we do not serve our fellow man as Christ does, unconditionally, we prevent ourselves from receiving some of the greatest things that our creator has in store for us. So, husbands, when you get home from a long day of work and you really don't feel like doing it, wash the dishes. Sons and daughters, when you're tired from all that homework, and it's your brother or sister's chore that week but you notice they are piled up, wash the dishes. When it's convenient, wash the dishes. When it hurts, wash the dishes. When the whole world turns its' back on you and wants to nail you to a cross, wash the dishes. And watch God pour out the blessing.
